The State of Child Hunger in NYC

Spring 2024

The need for food assistance in New York City remains significantly higher than it was before the pandemic, and families with children have been particularly hard hit. The cost of living in New York City continues to increase at an unsustainable rate. Food, childcare, and housing costs remain high, and many families are struggling to put meals on their tables. These challenges are often exacerbated during the summer months, when access to free school meals may become more limited.






Average monthly visits to food pantries, soup kitchens, and community food programs among NYC families in 2023.2
